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

#### A WONDERFUL MINISTRY OF FAITH



Father Adrian McInerney was ordained a priest of the Diocese of Ballarat in Mildura in August 1969. He commenced priestly ministry in St Alipius Parish in September 1969 and was appointed Chaplain to St Martin's in the Pines, then the Senior School of Sacred Heart College, Ballarat East, celebrating weekly Masses with the Sisters and the boarders who were in residence at that time. Adrian's association with the College was resumed when after many years serving in many different Parishes throughout the Ballarat Diocese, he returned to Ballarat East in 2001 and commenced as Co-Governor of Damascus College, representing the Canonical Administrators along with the representative of the Sisters of Mercy, most recently Sr Berenice Kerr. We have indeed been blessed to have Adrian as a significant person in the history of our College.

For much of his time as Parish Priest of St Alipius, Adrian has also been the Chair of the Diocesan Schools Board – in this position visiting many schools in the Diocese and joining overseas study tours – thus bringing to us a wealth of knowledge of general educational advancements as well as insights into Religious Education in schools.

He has been very generous in the time that he has given to our College community – celebrating the Eucharist with us on our major whole school celebrations and also for more mundane occasions. It has been rare that Adrian has not been with us to celebrate the significant times in the life of our College and his presence has always brought with it the gift of his gentle guidance and support to the community.

Adrian has the ability to bring God's message to life when he speaks to the assembly of over a thousand teenagers – his simple, reflective homilies always strike a chord which gives people a message to put into action. We thank him for all that he has shared with us.

At Adrian's Parish farewell, where many aspects of his ministry were highlighted, Sr. Berenice Kerr RSM, his Co-Governor of Damascus College, offered the following Blessing;

#### \*Adrian,

This is where your life has arrived after almost forty seven years of priestly ministry:

May you look back with graciousness and thanks on all your great and quiet achievements.

You stand on the shore of new invitation to open your life to things yet to be done: May your heart enjoy a different rhythm when drawn to the wonder of other horizons.

May you have the courage to find a new approach to time: May you allow it to slow until you find freedom to draw alongside the mystery you hold, and befriend your own beauty of soul.

May you find time to enjoy your heart's desire to live the dreams you've waited for, to awaken the depths beyond your work and enter into your infinite source.

May you realise that the shape of your soul is unique, that you have a special destiny; That behind the façade of your life there is something beautiful and eternal happening.

May you learn to see yourself with the same delight, pride and expectation with which God sees you in every moment.

And as you go to what is new, may the love and support of those gathered here go with you.

#### PETER THOMAS - ARTIST STATEMENT

To Live By The Light Of Christ to me means to be strong in your convictions but fluid and flexible enough to fold other people's ideas, thoughts and experiences into your own heart, which then helps to become a better person.

Since completing high school and university, my art work has involved themes of exploration and discovery. These themes run in obvious parallel with my own personal journey of growth; transitioning from school student to adult, developing personal values that can then be applied into my own work.

As with any artist, the investigation of personal identity crosses over into my own work. The concept of Jesus as a fisher of persons, is one that has resonated with me since the time I was old enough to understand why I was given the name of Peter by my parents. As an apostle, Peter was called to serve Jesus as he performed miracles and spread the word of God.

Peter's journey from fisherman to humble apostle characterises my understanding of how To Live By The Light Of Christ. Peter was willing to walk away from everything in his life to follow Jesus and become a better man. #### **BLAST FROM THE PAST**

50 YEAR ANNIVERSARY OF EDUCATION ON THE MT CLEAR SITE

Have you ever wondered where it all began? No, not life as we know it, but rather Damascus College as we know it today – this beautiful, leafy patch of the world we have all come to love and appreciate. This year we celebrate 50 years at the Mount Clear site, but what many of you may not realise is that it all began thanks to an amazing and generous woman by the name of Miss Alice Fanning (pictured).

Alice was born in Mount Clear on March 29, 1875 to Martin and Sarah Ann Fanning – originally of Ireland before settling in Australia. One of five children, Alice never married and eventually passed away at the Convent of Mercy, Ballarat East, on February 29 1960, having been looked after for several years by the Sisters of Mercy. Upon her death Alice bequeathed her entire Mount Clear property to the Sisters of Mercy on the understanding that a school or hospital would be built upon her land.

In 1964 the decision was made to build a senior campus of Sacred Heart College on the site, with the foundation stone being laid in 1966 (pictured) and the doors of St. Martin's in the Pines opening to Year 11 and 12 girls in 1967. The Official Opening and Blessing of the Sacred Heart College Senior School took place on the April 21 1968 and although the last 50 years has seen the College undergo many changes, it remains the same remarkable place of learning of which I believe Miss Alice Fanning would be proud to be a part.

Damascus was recognised twice in the awards announced as part of the opening. Visual Communication Design student Molly Hutchinson was the winner in the best digital media category, and Art student Joseph Short received high commendation for his ink on paper artwork. Both received a cheque for \$150.



#### **ROWING SEASON 2016/2017 IN REVIEW**

Now in its fourth season, the Damascus Rowing program is going from strength-to-strength. We experienced a 50% growth in numbers compared to last season, and with that came certain challenges but satisfying success across the 2016/17 rowing season. The program for this season boasted 18 crews (94 students in total) and we initiated our first foray into sculling with four of our senior girls taking up sculling in the later stages of this season. This tremendous growth in our program, and the improving sculling skill-level, reflects the growing enthusiasm for rowing among Damascus students and it was pleasing to see such genuine support from the school community.

The season kicked off in October 2016 with our rowers attending the Bendigo Sprint Regatta where we experienced several wins across the program. This success was quickly followed at the Nestles & Hamilton Regattas and the Dimboola Regatta where our Open Girls First Crew won the Head of Wimmera, a gruelling 6.2km time trial on the Wimmera River. Our plan to race more often was starting to pay dividends.

Our Senior and Intermediate crews trekked up to Nagambie in the final week of Term 4, 2016 to participate in the Carrum Regatta, where we raced other schools and club rowers to come away with seven bronze, eight silver and two gold medals. The following weekend, we participated in the Sacred Heart Regatta in Geelong, where we had our full program entered to race and for many of our junior crews, it was their first ever race experience. With many of our crews placing top three in their events, our performance at this regatta saw us win the trophy for being the most successful school, a huge coup considering we beat out some major established Melbourne schools for this prestigious award.

Over the summer school holidays, the program undertook two rowing camps held at Lake Wendouree where the students had

the opportunity to keenly develop their boat skills and fitness, and have a bit of fun along the way with their coaches and peers. Our parents group once again provided incredible support for our students; without their help and assistance, our rowing camps and many of our regatta days wouldn't get off the ground. Our parents helped to prepare all breakfasts', lunches and snacks for our students during our camps, as well as provide support and comfort to our students during some rather hot and arduous days. Our parents group also assisted us throughout the season with preparing regatta lunches and umpire lunches, boat holding, driving speed boats and ferrying umpires, helping with regatta day barbeque stalls, assisting with race timing, setting up marquees, loading/unloading boats, driving the boat trailer or helping with general repairs to our equipment.

The Regatta season came at us hard and fast at the end of the summer school holidays, where the program participated in three regattas in the lead up to the inaugural Head of the Schoolboys Regatta, which was held on Lake Wendouree. Our hard work and commitment paid off, as we had four boys crews entered (two each from our Intermediate and Junior boys program) and we came away with four wins - forever etching their names and Damascus College into the history books.

The team continued training with tenacity and determination, learning from their racing experience and always pushing themselves and supporting each other to perform at their best. Our spirits were buoyed as we headed into the Head of the Lake where we had 15 crews entered. It was also the first time our school had a crew in both the girls and boys Open Division 1 events, an incredibly proud and historic moment for our burgeoning rowing program. Our Senior Girls came second in the Open Girls Division 1 final, and our Senior Boys rowed gallantly against some



tough competition in the Open Boys Division 1 final and backed up again for an even better row in the historic re-row event. Other notable achievements include our Year 10 Boys Division 1 crew winning their final against a fast finishing St Patrick's crew, our Open Boys Division 5-6 crew came second as did our Year 10 Girls Division 4 crew. Both of these crews consisted mainly of new rowers who took up the sport just this season, so this was a great achievement for these students. Our Open Boys Division 3 crew and our Year 10 Girls Division 2 crew both came third in their finals. Congratulations to all students who participated in Head of the Lake this year, and represented Damascus College so proudly.

We also had several crews participate in the Rowing Victoria State Championships in Nagambie and also the Rowing Victoria Junior Girls State Championships which were held in Geelong for our Junior and Intermediate girls. Our attendance at these regattas saw quite a few podium finishes for our crews. Our Open Girls Division 1 Crew won the U19 Female Coxed Four title, and came third in the Female School Coxed Four Open Division 1. Our Year 10 Boys Division 1 Crew followed up their Head of Lake win by winning the state title for the Male C Grade Coxed Four. Our Year 10 Girls Division 3 crew also won a bronze medal. We also entered our first ever scullers, who all rowed well in their championship events and came away better for the experience.

As I write this report, our attention is turned to two major regattas; the upcoming Head of the Schoolgirls Regatta and the Australian Rowing Nationals in Sydney. For Head of the Schoolgirls, we will have two Senior Girls crews, four Intermediate Girls crews, three Junior Girls crews and our very first double scull entry and two single scull entries. We hope to send two crews (Senior Girls Division 1 and Intermediate Boys Division 1) to the Nationals which is another proud first for our program.

Our coaching group this year has consisted of Simon O'Brien, Narelle Burnside, Terry Austin, Michael Bennett, Kathryn Mills, John Marshall, Eliza Vincent, Georgia Edwards, Lainee Howard, Dean Kittelty, Matt Ashley, Tahnya Robson, Georgia Skene, Riley Taylor and Katelin Cartledge. I'd like to extend my sincere thanks to these incredible coaches for their personal commitment to our students and program, and for sharing their knowledge and experience with our crews. #### WESTERN BULLDOGS PLAYERS VISIT DAMASCUS TO PROMOTE READING


On Monday 20 February 2017 Damascus welcomed two AFL premiership players from the Western Bulldogs, Fletcher Roberts and Caleb Daniel.

A DAMASCUS LEGACY OF TEACHING, A CONVERSATION WITH DONNIE DAVIDSON



Donnie was born up on the beautiful Murray River with rich red loam soil and where the most luscious grapes and citrus fruit are grown, in Mildura. She attended Mildura High School and lived there until she was 18, leaving to move to Melbourne to study. In those days there were few tertiary education facilities in regional cities. Everyone had to move away to become teachers, nurses and other professionals.

Donnie's favourite subjects were History (American in Form 5 - Year 11) and Australian in Matriculation (Year 12) and Geography. She learned about many countries in Geography as they had to know their population, topography, climate, manufacturing, agriculture and more! Sounds boring, but combined with the histories covered every year, she learned so much about the world. Much of these two subjects has been useful and enriching throughout her life, especially when travelling.

### What achievements have you had since finishing secondary school?

Higher Diploma of Teaching - Secondary.

Teaching career of 40 years – one year Ouyen High School, eight years Sale High School, 31 years St Martins in the Pines/Damascus College (plus three years Family Leave).

Leadership positions at Damascus College.

I was also fortunate enough to teach two students in Health & Human Development in 2003 who achieved study scores of 50. This is the statistical Everest dream of every Year 12 teacher!

Foundation President of Ballarat Quilters and Life Member.

Married to George for nearly 40 years.

Two fantastic children – George (Class of 2001) and Kate (Class of 2003) – both of whom are married to our special children-in-law Katie and Jason respectively. George and Katie have given us two much adored granddaughters, Lily three and a half and Ava two in May to enjoy, spoil and hand back! We also have a delightful step-granddaughter, Stephanie, 23.

To raise our two children is my (along with George) greatest achievement.

#### What is your current job?

For the past two years I have been teaching part-time after stepping down from a leadership position.

#### What is your employment history with Damascus?

I began teaching part-time at St Martins in the Pines on April 29, 1986. I was employed for the rest of the year to take over Marina Kahm's Year 10 and 11 Food classes while she was on long service leave. I was based at both Sacred Heart and St Martins. The Year 11 students used to catch a bus into Sacred Heart for the practical classes. They arrived for our first class with one of the girls dressed up in a clown outfit. What an introduction!

At the end of the year Sr Valda asked if I would continue taking the Year 11 Food (the girls still travelling in by bus at recess with me following in my car) and taking over the Year 11 Textiles class from Mark McLean's mother, Dorothy.

Later that year Sr Valda mentioned she wanted to change the art room to a new kitchen for the campus so St Martins in the Pines could also offer Year 12 Food. She asked me to prepare the plans, so out came our first house plan and the four kitchen units were based on that!

From 1988 as my teaching load increased I began teaching the subjects that have been my teaching staples – Human Development & Society/Health & Human Development, Food Technology and Textiles. All that has changed have been the year levels. There has only been one year in which I didn't teach Year 12, due to a term of long service leave. Time off has been various amounts of long service leave and the rare medical problem.

#### How did you get in to the job that you are in now?

Early in 1986 someone at Loreto discovered there was a qualified Food/Textiles teacher on the loose in Ballarat (we had been here a year) and I worked two days as a casual relief teacher at Loreto before I had a call from Sr Valda who needed a replacement for Marina, as mentioned above. My interview with Sr Valda and Adrian Mullaly occurred in our loungeroom with George Jr next door and Kate asleep in her cot! Who would have guessed this opportunity would result in nearly half my life being spent in the one school.

#### What other jobs have you had since graduating high school?

I have been a teacher for my whole career. The only other job I have had has been in the Red Tulip chocolate factory in Prahran over the summer holiday break of 1972-73!

#### What do you enjoy about your current job?

My current job has been my only job. I love teaching. It is hard to explain, as every teacher who has a passion for teaching loves it for different reasons. I thrive on interaction with others both students and staff. I enjoy the challenge of the classroom, developing mutual respect, seeing the 'lightbulb' go off, changing teaching styles for different learners and different age groups, (going from Year 7 Food to Year 12 Health & Human Development requires a mindset change-over in the five minutes between classes), changing how and what I teach from year to year (you should see my collection of obsolete folders in the garage), running into past students in my day to day life; and watching 12 year olds mature into young adults ready to take on their world, the product of all their teachers over the six years. And finally, the experience I had yesterday, in the twilight of my career - a guest speaker for my Year 11 Health & Human Development class being a former student, Jo Labbett (Lund) and discovering a Year 9 Textiles student is the daughter of one of my son's Damascus school friends, Zoe Armstrong.

#### What are you now looking forward to in your life/career?

Retiring at the end of this year! Being able to take a greater role in our grandchildren's lives. Continuing to travel – there are still a few places to visit. Improving my level of physical activity. Finding something part-time to fill the gap of teaching – volunteering or my second career! Reading more books.

On Wednesday 26 October 2016 the Retired Staff Group met at the Royal Mail in Sebastopol at 12.30pm for a get together and lunch.


